

Preface

In the summer of 1939, six months after the discovery of uranium fission, American newspapers and magazines openly discussed the prospect of atomic energy. However, most American physicists doubted that atomic energy or atomic bombs were realistic possibilities.

October 11, 1939, President Roosevelt reads a letter from Albert Einstein warning him of the dangers of Nazi research into uranium fission.

For the next two years, official skepticism continued to stall U.S. research efforts. A large-scale U.S. atomic project did not begin until December 6, 1941, one day before the bombing of Pearl Harbor. It became the "Manhattan" Project in August 1942.

In 1943 the Manhattan Project, built Los Alamos in the Sangria de Cristo Mountains, a U.S. crash program to develop an atomic bomb.

August 6, 1945 - "Little Boy" a uranium bomb was dropped over Hiroshima Japan. August 9, 1945 - "Fat Man" was detonated over Nagasaki Japan ending World War II.

August 1999 – At MD Anderson Cancer Center Dr. Martin Korbling said to me, "**This country – with a dynamic leader – within three to five years – we could have the cure for cancer.**"
